## 2011-2012 SCHOOL YEAR END REPORT

---

### OVERVIEW

---

Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers is available to **161,444\*** secondary students in **184** secondary schools within **16** Tarrant County school districts. This program allows students to provide anonymous tips that will aid the school administration and local law enforcement in solving crimes. The students in Tarrant County receive a monetary reward ranging from \$10 - \$1,000 if the tip proves instrumental in solving the crime. Campus Crime Stoppers promotes school spirit, pride and responsibility and allows students to take action against victimization and crime in their school.

The 2011-2012 school year was the sixth year for the new program and the sixth year of operation for the Tarrant County Crime Stoppers Call Center. Crime Stoppers announced the new You Earn, They Learn Stop Truancy program this year and introduced the availability of mobile app tips. Crime Stoppers also offered the Gun & Gang Busters bonus reward program and the Friends for Life program again this year. To promote the program, the Crime Stoppers civilian and officer coordinators held **13** meetings with district administrators across Tarrant County and distributed **5,494** posters, **400** magnets, and **3,600** cards.

Overall, the Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers program received **857** tips resulting in **136** arrests, **136** students administratively disciplined, **272** cases cleared, **\$1,691** in drugs seized, **\$3,367** in recovered property and **3** weapons seized.

---

### THE CAMPUS CRIME STOPPERS PROGRAM

---

Safe City Commission launched the rejuvenated and streamlined Campus Crime Stoppers program during the 2006-2007 school year. Several program changes were implemented in order to ensure that the anonymity of each student is held at the utmost importance. Students may now report information on crimes that occurred on a campus within Tarrant County to the Safe City Commission Crime Stoppers hotline, submit tips online or via text message, provide tip information via anonymous live web chat, or submit a tip using a mobile app on a smart phone.

On April 17, 2006, Safe City Commission opened the first Crime Stoppers Call Center in Tarrant County. Safe City Commission Crime Stoppers serves all Tarrant County municipalities and school districts. The Call Center is staffed seven days a week, from 7:00

am – midnight, by area off-duty public safety dispatchers and police personnel. Call takers are responsible for coordinating the tips and ensuring that the information is disseminated to the proper school contact in a timely manner. There is no Caller ID, calls are not recorded, and call takers do not ask for any personal information in order to maintain the student's anonymity. Students may report tips to the hotline - **817-469-TIPS (8477)** - before, during, or after school. If a student would like to report a Crime Stoppers tip during school hours, it has been suggested that school administrators and officers provide the student with a private setting (i.e. office, library, etc) to call the hotline or send a web tip. Students do not have to compromise their identity to provide information on both petty and serious crimes. Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers encourages students to be responsible citizens and take action against crime in their school.

Since money often provides a great incentive for reporting information, Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers pays reward amounts that range from **\$10-\$1,000** and in **68** categories of offenses. During the 2011-2012 school year, Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers paid **202** rewards valued at **\$12,650** for a variety of offenses including drugs, theft, vandalism, assault, graffiti, arson, tobacco, and weapon possession. Students pick up all Campus Crime Stoppers rewards from one of **seventeen (17)** pre-selected Chase Bank branches across Tarrant County. Safe City Commission requires all tips to be picked up from a bank to further protect the student's anonymity and to maintain fiscal control over the reward funds.

## CONTACTING CAMPUS CRIME STOPPERS

---

**WEB TIPS** - In addition to calling the hotline, the ability to receive Crime Stoppers tips online is another feature of the Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers program. Students may go to [www.469tips.com](http://www.469tips.com) and click on "Submit a Campus Tip." The student will then be instructed to answer detailed questions about the crime that occurred and any potential suspects. When the student is finished, the tip will be submitted to the Crime Stoppers database and passed on to the proper authority. No email address is required to submit a tip and the IP address of the computer is not recorded in order to maintain the student's anonymity. Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a total of **161** web tips in this school year.

**TEXT TIPS** - Students may text a tip to Safe City Commission Crime Stoppers. To send a text message, tipsters are instructed to **text "TIP117 plus their message" to CRIMES (274637)**. The tip goes directly to the company that designed the system specifically for Crime Stoppers programs. The company removes the cell phone number of the tipster and forwards the message to Crime Stoppers. The tipster gets an instant message with their randomly assigned tip number. It all happens in a matter of seconds. Tips are passed on to the coordinator of the school for investigation. Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a total of **89** text message tips in this school year.

**LIVE WEB CHAT** - In September 2009, Safe City Commission Crime Stoppers added an anonymous live web chat feature as another tool for soliciting tips on Tarrant County crimes. The software, available through Fort Worth-based Nexus Systems, allows tipsters to

engage in a two-way communication system, similar to online instant messaging. Tipsters may initiate a live chat by going to the Crime Stoppers homepage at [www.469tips.com](http://www.469tips.com) and clicking on “**Chat.**” The live web chat feature allows tipsters to provide new tip information, check on old tip information, or ask general questions about the program in real time. Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a total of **4** live web chat tips in this school year.

MOBILE APP TIPS - Starting in August 2011, tipsters could contact Crime Stoppers using their smart phone. Tipsters are instructed to download the 'Tip Submit' mobile app for free from the Apple App Store or Android Market. Through the app, unlimited message length is available and tipsters may also submit images and videos. For school-related tips, student tipsters may auto-locate the nearest school in which to submit a tip or select a school manually. During the 2011-2012 school year, Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received **73** mobile app tips.

---

### **GUN & GANG BUSTERS PROGRAM**

---

The specialized program facilitated through Safe City Commission Crime Stoppers is Gun & Gang Busters, which aims at breaking down a code of silence that often exists among gangs and people who witness gang-related or gun-related crimes. In addition to the traditional Crime Stoppers money rewarded for a particular crime, Safe City Commission Crime Stoppers will add a bonus reward of up to \$250 for tip information leading to an arrest(s) in gun and/or gang-related crimes in Tarrant County. Examples *include but are not limited to* aggravated offenses involving a gun, drug offenses involving a gang member(s), gang graffiti and criminal mischief, and coercing, soliciting, or inducing gang membership. Only tips that are received through the Crime Stoppers are eligible for the reward. During the 2011-2012 school year, a total of **3** bonus rewards were provided for campus-related tips involving guns and/or gangs.

---

### **FRIENDS FOR LIFE PROGRAM**

---

The Campus Crime Stoppers Friends for Life Program began as a partnership with the Fort Worth ISD “It’s Not Okay” campaign during the 2010-2011 school year. The campaign encourages students to make healthy decisions and ask for help when they or their friends are in need. The tagline of this campaign is “It’s Okay to Help a Friend.” The Campus Crime Stoppers Friends for Life Program focuses on behaviors and issues that can place the student and others at risk and serves as a resource for students who want to report fellow students who are victims of bullying, cyber bullying, sexting, dating or family violence, gang activity, sexual harassment, or has suicidal tendencies. The program is available to all school districts in Tarrant County currently served by the Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers program and served Arlington ISD, Birdville ISD, Eagle Mountain-Saginaw ISD, Fort Worth ISD and Mansfield ISD this school year. Campus Crime Stoppers Friends for Life received a total of **45** tips and paid **4** rewards in this school year.

---

## YOU EARN, THEY LEARN. STOP TRUANCY PROGRAM

---

The “You Earn, They Learn. Stop Truancy” Program began in August 2011 as part of Arlington Police Department’s Truancy Reduction/Focus Toward Attendance Program, which provides numerous methods and alternatives in addressing truancy. Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers paid students and citizens a reward for identifying students who were truant or skipping school during school hours. The goal of the program was to give students, citizens, businesses, and other stakeholders in the community another outlet in combating truancy. This program was a partnership between Crime Stoppers, Arlington Police Department, Arlington Independent School District, Mansfield Independent School District, and Mansfield Independent School District Police Department. The “You Earn, They Learn. Stop Truancy” Program received a total of **198** truancy and skipping tips and paid **\$780** in rewards.

### CAMPUS CRIME STOPPERS STATISTICS BY ISD

**Arlington ISD** – In the Arlington Independent School District, **77%** of the secondary schools received at least one tip. The two most active schools in the district – [Lamar High School](#) and [Martin High School](#) – had a combined total of **75** tips resulting in **15** arrests, **1** student administratively disciplined, **17** cases cleared, **\$231** in drugs seized, and **\$1,800** in recovered property; **14** rewards valued at **\$1,625** were paid.

**Birdville ISD** – In the Birdville Independent School District, **75%** of the secondary schools received at least one tip. The three most active schools in the district – [Birdville High School](#), [Haltom High School](#), and [Richland High School](#) – had a combined total of **68** tips resulting in **15** arrests, **33** students administratively disciplined, **48** cases cleared, **\$250** in drugs seized, and **\$310** in recovered property; **32** rewards valued at **\$2,885** were paid.

The most active high school was **Paschal High School** with **15** tips resulting in **3** arrests, **1** student administratively disciplined, **8** cases cleared, and **\$160** in drugs seized; **6** rewards valued at **\$500** were paid.

## SUCCESS STORIES

---

### **Tip Alerts to Social Media Mania** – Fossil Ridge High School

Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a tip about a possible shooting at Fossil Ridge High School on a Monday in May. The tip advised that several unknown suspects were planning on “Shooting up the Ridge” on both Twitter and Facebook. The tipster advised that on the prior Friday there were five fights involving multiple students and that it had been reported that the fights had been racially motivated between two groups of students over a shoe. The tipster gave several names of the Twitter and Facebook accounts that were posting information on this potential shooting. The Principal was contacted at home over the weekend in order to start the investigation. The Fort Worth Police Department and school administrators were at the school early. Students went through metal detectors before entering the school. The students involved were charged with Assault from the fights and received school discipline for Posting on Media Network and causing a disruption.



### **Student Busted for “Brownies” Thanks to Tip – Paschal High School**

Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a tip regarding a student in possession of baked brownies with marijuana in them. The tip described the student and the location of the brownies, which were located in a black backpack in a large clear plastic baggy. The student was arrested for Delivery of Marijuana in a Drug Free Zone. The tipster received \$150 for the tip information.

### **Tip Leads Authorities to Gun and Drugs – North Side High School**

Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a tip about a conversation that was overheard between four students who were talking about fighting and using weapons like knives, brass knuckles, and a ‘strap’ (gun). The School Resource Officer was immediately notified and was subsequently able to locate the suspect, who took off running through the courtyard. The student was found to be in possession of a 0.25 cal semi-auto hand gun and .26 grams of Alprazolm. The student was arrested for Places Weapons Prohibited, Unlawful Carry of a Weapon, and Possession of a Controlled Substance. In addition to the regular Crime Stoppers reward, the tipster received a Gun & Gang Busters bonus reward due to the weapons offense. The tipster received \$500 in total for this tip information.

### **Gang Fight Interrupted Due to Tip – Paschal High School**

Safe City Commission Campus Crime Stoppers received a tip about a large gang fight that was going to take place at the Wendy’s parking lot across from the school when school concluded for the day. The school resource officer and beat officer arrived at the location during the gang fight. While the officers were breaking up the fight, one officer was assaulted by a suspect who then ran from the scene. This tipster received \$50 for the tip information and an additional \$50 through the Gun and Gang Busters bonus reward program. On the same day as the fight, Crime Stoppers received another tip identifying the student who assaulted the police officer. The tipster provided the location of the suspect and officers arrested the suspect for Engaging in Organized Crime Assault Public Servant, Evading Arrest, and Hindering Apprehension. Detectives discovered that this fight, which was between the Varro Centro and the 901 Bloods, had been posted on YouTube. The second tipster received \$50 for the tip information and an additional \$50 through the Gun and Gang Busters bonus reward program.
