Executive Summary

Since 1982, tips coming in over the Crime Stoppers hotline in Tarrant County have resulted in excess of \$3,297,990 in rewards being paid to anonymous tipsters. These tips resulted in the recovery of over \$39,669,389 worth of stolen property and narcotics, 15,292 law breaking individuals being arrested, and 35,739 cases being cleared.

The Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County Program has two operational divisions. Collectively, in 2021 these divisions paid \$66,240 in rewards. These rewards helped effect the recovery of \$1,212,519 in stolen property and narcotics, the arrest of 149 individuals, and the clearing of 486 cases.

The Community Program - 2021

Countywide, Crime Stoppers assisted in the recovery of stolen property and narcotics valued at \$1,212,279. In addition, 130 arrests were made, 309 cases were cleared, and \$58,225 in rewards was paid in 2021.

The Campus Program - 2021

Rewards for the Campus Crime Stoppers Program totaled \$8,015, with \$240 in stolen property and narcotics being recovered, 19 individuals arrested, 128 administratively disciplined, and 177 cases cleared on Tarrant County elementary, middle, and high school campuses.




Community Program Stats

Tips Received & Hotline Calls




In 2021, Crime Stoppers returned to prepandemic levels of tips received. **1,690** tips were received via mobile app, **617** through the web tip form, and **27** through the online live chat. See Pg. 15 for a more detailed look at tips received.

Offense Types (2021)




Similar to past years, Crime Stoppers received **1,606 narcotics-related tips** in 2021. There were **196 homicide** tips, up from 102 in 2019 and 163 in 2020. **Fugitive tips** fell from 696 in 2019, 469 in 2020, and **461 in 2021.** See Pg. 16 for a complete view of offense types.

Arrests Made & Cases Cleared




Arrests made and cases cleared continued to trend downwards in 2021. From a high in 2019, arrests made dropped by 38% and cases cleared dropped by 47% in 2021. See Pg. 17 for a full breakdown by law enforcement agency.

Property & Narcotics Recovered



After a 203% increase in 2020, property recovered and narcotics seized remained at a high level with only a 15% decrease in 2021. See Pg. 17 for a full breakdown by law enforcement agency.

Rewards Paid




2021 saw a continued downward trend of rewards paid with a decrease of 28% from 2020. Both Fort Worth PD and Arlington PD had 3% of tips received lead to a reward payout. 14% of tips received by Tarrant County SO lead to reward payment. See Pg. 17 for a full breakdown by law enforcement agency.

The average monthly reward payout in 2021 was \$4,852 compared to a monthly average of \$6,479 in 2020. March saw a reward total of \$8,900, the highest for 2021. See Pg. 17 for a full breakdown by law enforcement agency.

Most Wanted % Arrested




221 fugitives were posted by the Fort Worth PD, 107 by the Tarrant County's SO, and 41 by Arlington PD. Crime Stoppers tips resulted in 9 arrests by FWPD, 4 by the TCSO, and 3 by APD.

Gun & Gang Busters Program

Gun & Gang Busters is a bonus reward program that will add up to \$250 to a traditional reward for tips related to gun and/or gang-related crimes. 17 Gun & Gang bonus rewards were paid in 2021 with a total of \$3,650 paid out. In comparison, there were 29 bonus rewards paid in both 2019 and 2020 resulting in \$6,800 and \$6,300 total paid, respectively.



Tips Received





CCS Offense Types (2021)




Tips received through the Campus Crime Stoppers program were mostly drug related (n = 160), like years prior. Assault/Threat tips increased by 131% and Theft/Vandalism increased by 703% compared to 2020. See Pg. 18 for a complete view of offense types.

Arrests Made, Cases Cleared, Admin Discipline




Arrests, cases cleared, and administrative disciplines have continued to remain low compared to relative highs in 2019. However, cases cleared and administrative disciplines did rise slightly from 2020 to 2021. Visit Pg. 19 for further breakdown by ISD.

FFL Victimization Issues (2021)



Bullying was the most common victimization issue reported through Friends for Life (n = 65). FFL tips increased by 26% from 2020 to 2021, but is still at a 47% decrease compared to 2019. See Pg. 20 for a complete view of victimization issues reported.

After a 65% decrease from 2019 to 2020, CCS/FFL saw a **44% increase from 2020 to 2021.** The most Campus Crime Stoppers Rewards Paid came from Keller ISD. See Pg. 19 for a full breakdown by school district.

Rewards Amount



The average monthly reward payout in 2021 was \$667 compared to a monthly average of \$525 in 2020, a 27% increase. September saw a reward total of \$2,865, the highest for 2021. See Pg. 19 for a full breakdown by school district.

Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County worked hard this year to build programming capacity, increase engagement and outreach—particularly to school partners—and respond to community needs.


2021 Crime Stoppers Programming Activities

Monthly Newsletter – Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County prepares a monthly enewsletter that is distributed to the **2,227 individuals** subscribed to our mailing list. Each newsletter highlights Crime Stoppers program activities, monthly awareness themes, resource links, self-care tips, and featured stories. 







September 2021 Ad

• To increase engagement from the community, Crime Stoppers posts monthly ads that run for 2 weeks at a time. The monthly average reach for each ad was 6,506 individuals; an engagement average of 787; and each ad cost an average of 13 cents per engagement.



New School Materials and Resources - The Crime Stoppers programming staff worked hard over the summer of 2021 to create new school resources and materials for our school partners. This included a new and improved Campus Crime Stoppers Operational Manual, engagement flyers on Campus Crime Stoppers and Friends for Life, implementation and engagement checklists for school personnel, and new QR code stickers.









QR Code Project - In December 2021, Crime Stoppers mailed out a letter, a flyer with an overview of the Campus Crime Stoppers and Friends for Life programs, and two newly designed and printed QR Code stickers to all principals in the 527 Tarrant County school served by Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County. It was suggested that the front-adhesive stickers can be placed in high traffic areas so that students can quickly snap a picture of the QR code which will lead them to the Crime Stoppers website, reporting options, and social media pages. This letter was a mechanism to provide each principal with valuable information about how to best utilize and engage with the Campus Crime Stoppers program.

Awareness & Engagement Google Site -

An <u>Awareness & Engagement Google Site</u> was created for school partners so that they had one central location with all the necessary materials for engagement on their campuses. This site is different from the main website in that it provides school personnel access to documents and forms that are not for public distribution while also providing other engagement resources.





Sponsor of Virtual Stop Violence

Conference - Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County sponsored One Safe Place's first ever 3-day Virtual Stop Violence Conference. We had over 75 attendees who learned about new emerging trends and innovative strategies on crime prevention and victimization issues.

Fort Worth PD Narcotics and Vice Tiplines Merger

Starting in early 2021, the Fort Worth Police Department began transitioning the internal Narcotics Tip Line and Database over to Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County. Previously, there were two ways for narcotics tips within the City of Fort Worth to be taken and assigned: Crime Stopper of Tarrant County would take tips and the city also utilized a narcotics tip line. Both of these sources were then fed into a single narcotics database maintained by the Narcotics Unit with entries into said database occurring by one specific person, who worked in neither the Narcotics nor the Crime Stoppers Units.

Additionally, the Narcotics Unit was tasked with keeping up with information in two different databases, updating them both to ensure tip closer and the accuracy of future searches for information.

After reviewing previous years' call numbers between the two lines, it was discovered that very few calls actually came into the city tip line. Most of the tips in the Narcotics Database were Crime Stoppers tips from the P3 system. It was proposed that the Narcotics line be routed toward the Crime Stoppers system and entry and assignment control be placed under the duties of the Crime Stoppers unit with input into assignment policy from the Narcotics Unit. The goal of this merger was the simplification of multiple positions, simplification of the systems used to this end, relief of extra duties placed on multiple persons working within the department, and a reduction in un-actionable tips for the Narcotics unit with less repeated work.

In February of 2021, Fort Worth Crime Stoppers personnel met with Narcotics Unit personnel and hammered out an assignment schedule and plan. The Narcotics teams were given team email addresses through the City of Fort Worth and those emails were added to the P3 system. New incoming tips, after being vetted by Crime Stoppers personnel, are now forwarded to the 3 Narcotics teams on a rotational basis. Those teams respond and update tips in the P3 system ensuring that all involved parties are kept up to date on the status of the tips.

The Vice Unit was also added to the P3 system in 2021. After going through the training and implementation process, Crime Stoppers started seeing more responses on tips and positive outcomes. For example, in December 2021, five suspects were arrested for Possession of Controlled Substance, Keeping a Gambling Place, Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Gambling that resulted in the seizure of \$10,546 in cash, \$3,368 worth of meth, marijuana, and pills, and two weapons.

Devious Lick TikTok Challenge

The "Devious Lick" challenge originated on TikTok. An individual will attempt to "successfully" steal an item from the school that would usually be something hard and/or ridiculous to steal. This includes items like soap dispensers, "Caution Wet Floor" signs, toilet paper holders, road signs, keyboards, computer monitors, and anything deemed significant enough for the challenge.

There is no material reward for this behavior other than the possibility of personal/social media clout and popularity.



Additionally, the Narcotics Unit was tasked with keeping up with information in two different databases, updating them both to ensure tip closer and the accuracy of future searches for information.

Many of our school staff/faculty partners became aware of this challenge when it started popping up around our communities' schools in September 2021. There were bathrooms destroyed, classrooms vandalized, and other various items stolen off school property. Through the Campus Crime Stoppers program, we began receiving tips related to this challenge on September 13th. From September 13th to September 29th we have received almost 100 anonymous tips from all over the county related to the Devious Lick TikTok challenge. From September 14th to September 20th we received 20 anonymous tips that provided good information that led to disciplinary action or arrests for students who participated in the Devious Lick TikTok challenge.

Soon after this challenge started making headlines across the country, TikTok made a public statement that they would be banning all content on their platform that is related to the Devious Lick challenge. Fortunately, this seems to have had a positive effect on reducing the popularity of the challenge. Our anonymous hotline was equipped to handle the fallout from this TikTok challenge and will be available to assist on taking tips involving future TikTok challenges.

2021 Success Stories

Even as Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County and the community at large continue to recalibrate as we approach a new normal caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, there have been notable success stories over the past year. These stories exemplify the work that Crime Stoppers does in the past, present, and future.

Over \$170k Recovered by the Arlington PD Narcotics Unit

The Arlington Police Department's Narcotics Unit a tip from Crime Stoppers about suspicious activity taking place at a local auto shop. APD officers then conducted surveillance on the business where they witnessed two vehicles arrive and then quickly leave the location. Both vehicles were pulled over for committing traffic violations—and officers subsequently conducted probable cause searches of each. Between the two vehicles, APD recovered \$5,170 in marijuana, a handgun, and \$167K in cash. The APD arrested the two drivers on various drug and weapons charges.

Euless PD Makes a Huge Narcotics Bust

On February 9, 2021, Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County received a tip on drug activity occurring at a residence in Euless, Texas. The Euless Police Department conducted an investigation and were able to make arrests that SAME day. As a result of this anonymous tip information, officers made two arrests where each individual was charged with Manufacture/Delivery of Controlled Substance (Psilocybin), Manufacture/Delivery of Controlled Substance (Amphetamine), Manufacture/Delivery of Controlled Substance (LSD), Manufacture/Delivery of Controlled Substance (MDMA), possession of marijuana, and two counts of prohibited weapon possession. In addition to the arrests, five guns, \$1,462 in cash, and \$131,548 worth of MDMA, LSD, Amphetamine, Marijuana, THC, Psilocybin, THC Edibles, THC Pens, and Alprazolam were seized. The tipster who helped lead the Euless PD to this arrest will receive the full Crime Stoppers reward of \$1,250 for their anonymous tip information.

With Help of Crime Stoppers Tip Suspect Arrested, Charged with Murder in Fatal Hit-and-Run Crash

The Arlington Police Department has made an arrest in connection to a fatal hit-and-run crash that occurred on July 2, 2021. APD detectives assigned to the U.S. Marshals North Texas Fugitive Task Force located 42-year-old Charlton Harris at a motel in Grand Prairie and took him into custody without incident. Harris was charged with Murder, Accident Involving Death, and Public Intoxication.

Evidence gathered at the scene, as well as an anonymous Crime Stoppers tip that was prompted by local media coverage of this case, helped investigators identify Mr. Harris as the suspect who struck a Toyota Camry at a high rate of speed, killing the driver, 39-year-old Douglas Oseimo.

"We are grateful for the community participation and tips that came in," said Arlington Chief of Police Al Jones. "Oftentimes, we need the public's help to solve these types of cases and that is exactly what happened in this instance."

Major Narcotics Seizure in Fort Worth

In September 2021, Fort Worth Police Department Narcotic Officers from arrived at a residence to conduct a search for narcotics. Multiple narcotics were located and seized from the location. The suspect was deceased therefore no arrest were made. A total of 91 Grams of THC wax, 18.35 lbs. marijuana, 389 grams of powder cocaine, 626 grams of alprazolam, 67 grams of Adderall, and multiple live marijuana plants worth \$672,419 were seized.

The program aims at breaking down a code of silence that often exists among gangs and people who witness gang-related or gun-related crimes.
